Black History Month



The month of February is

Why was February chosen as Black History Month?

Carter G. Woodson, a pioneer of African American studies, declared that one week in February should be dedicated to celebrating two public figures that significantly influenced Black history. This week included the birthdays of U.S. President Abraham Lincoln, born February 12th, and African-American abolitionist Frederick Douglass, born February 14th. In the early 1940s and towards the 60s, as the Civil Rights Movement began to advance, many Black communities around America turned that one week in February into a month of celebration and remembrance. Eventually, in 1976, U.S. President Gerald Ford officially recognized February as Black History Month, a month of acknowledgment and appreciation of Black culture, history, and achievements.
